





Quarter 2019








Requests For Service 5 Year









Statistical Analysis

There was a total of 397 calls for service during the three-month period. This includes the total number of calls responded to by Yountville Station personnel. The breakdowns of emergency calls in the town of Yountville are as follows:

Medical Aids:	275
Public Assists:	21
Traffic Collisions:	25
Vehicle Fires:	2
Alarm Soundings:	39
Structure Fires:	12
Vegetation Fires:	6
Miscellaneous Fires:	3
Rescues:	4
Hazardous Conditions:	8
Smoke checks:	2

Of the total 397 calls, the breakdown according to response area is as follows:

Town of Yountville:	99 Calls
Veterans Home:	160 Calls
County Areas:	136 Calls
Napa City:	2 Calls

These averages are mostly consistent with past history and call analysis. There is a slight decline in calls from the Veterans Home due to a new dispatch procedure. As is typical with virtually all Fire Departments today, our largest call volume continues to be medical emergencies.

Major Events

Hazardous Materials- Suspicious Package

In late September Engine 212 (Reserve Engine) responded as part of the Napa County Hazardous Materials Team to a call for a suspicious white powder in the Browns Valley area in the City of Napa. After numerous hours and analysis preformed the suspicious material was deemed not to be a public safety hazard.

Meadowlark Fire Multiple Structures

On August 9th Engine and Truck 12 responded in mutual aid to assist Napa City for a house fire on Meadowlark Lane that had spread to the adjacent home. Crews spent a few hours containing and overhauling the scene and were able to save a small dog that had ran back inside one of the homes.

House Fire Sandra St

Engine and Truck 12 fought a house fire on Sandra St on August 11th. Station personnel were able to contain the fire to garage, keeping the damage to the living space to a minimum level.

Fires Near The Railroad Tracks

Engine and Truck 12 where able to contain multiple fires over a period of a few days that occurred to the north and south of Town. No property damage occurred and the causes are still under investigation. Station 12 personal would like to remind the public to please slow down when driving through smoke as there may be emergency personnel and vehicles that are being obstructed by the smoke.

Special Events

Fourth of July

Public Safety Training

This quarter, crews at station 12, continued to visit local wineries and businesses for fire extinguisher training as well as CPR training. The crews conduct annual fire safety practices as well as fire extinguisher training to staff upon request.

Training

Trainings

During the last quarter the crew have been busy with multiple trainings. We continue to train with our local volunteer companies from Rutherford and Dry Creek and our Explorers. We also assisted with our late rehire academy to hire new seasonal firefighters for those who left to return to school or other priorities.

Safety Message

October is fire prevention month and we encourage you to take a moment to test your smoke detectors and practice escape routes in the home. We are always available for assistance with smoke detectors or any fire prevention assistance.
