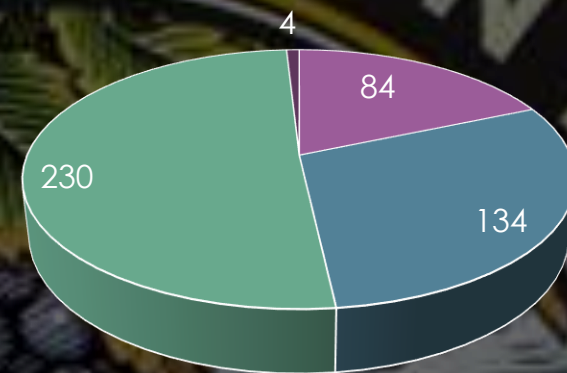

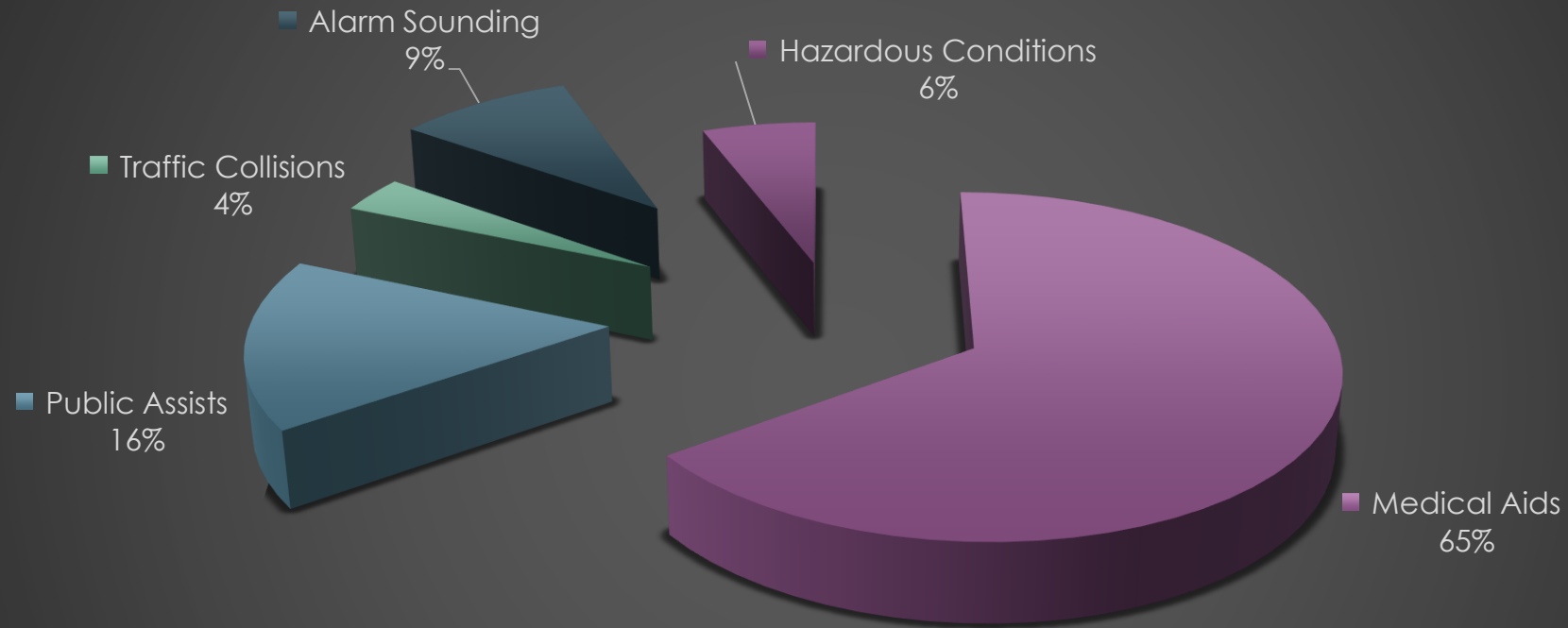
### Requests For Service 5 Year Average

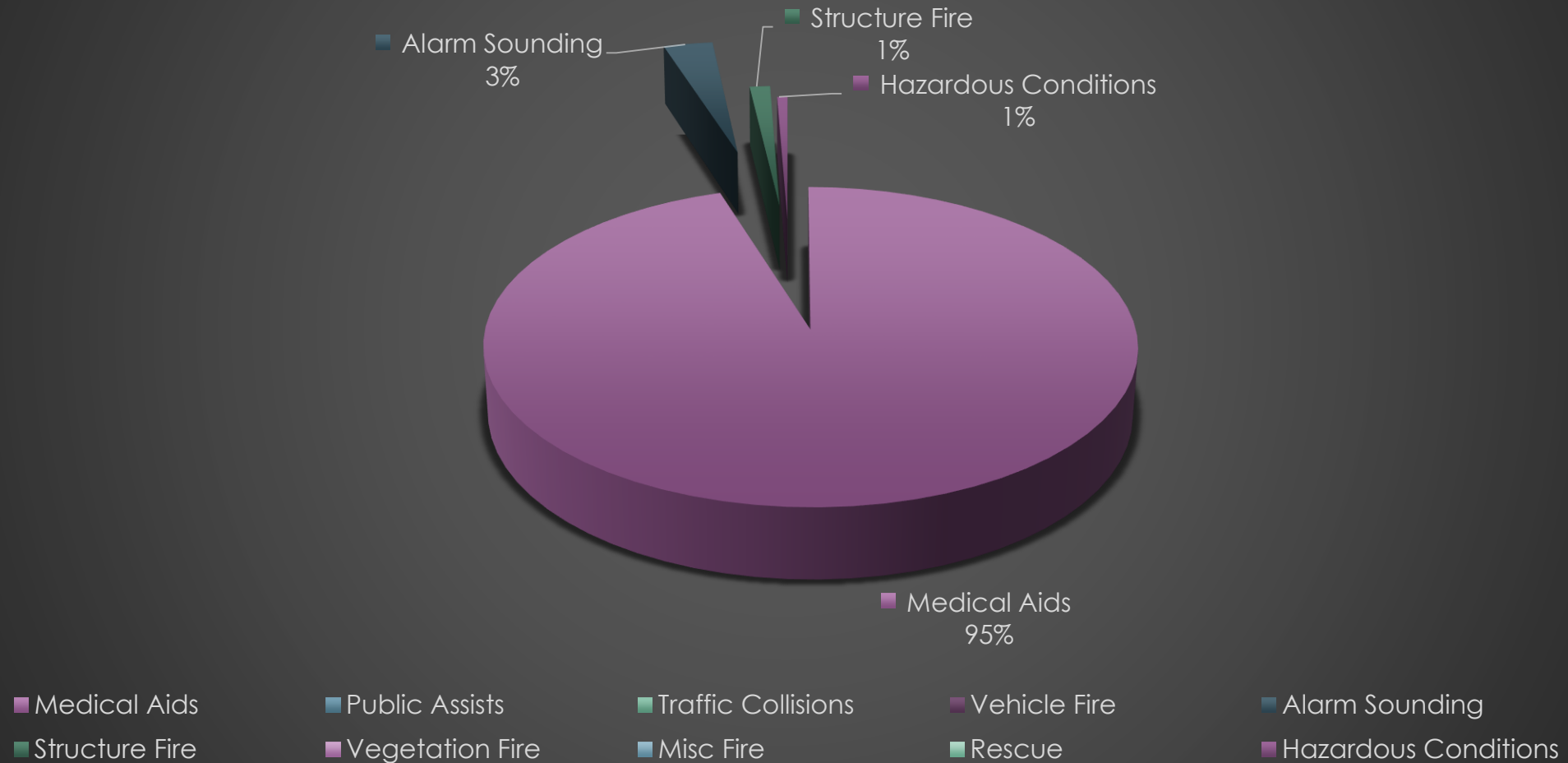

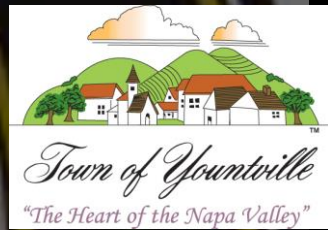
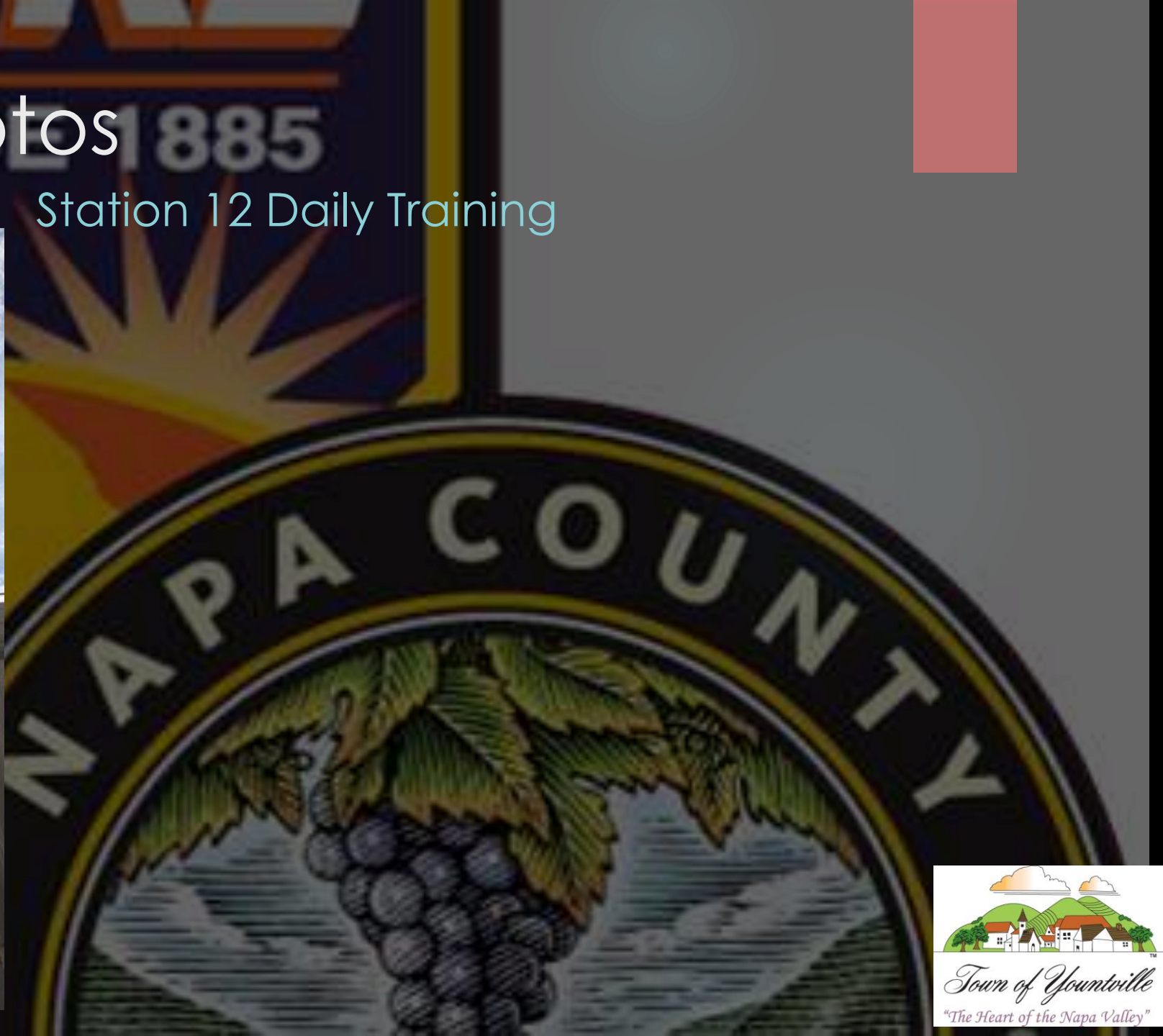

## **Fire Department Summary**

### **Statistical Analysis**

The attached spreadsheet shows a total of 366 calls for the three-month period. This includes the total number of calls responded to by Yountville Station personnel. The breakdowns of emergency calls in the Town of Yountville are as follows:

Medical Aids:	56
Public Assists:	14
Traffic Collisions:	3
Vehicle Fires:	0
Alarm Soundings:	8
Structure Fires:	0
Vegetation Fires:	0
Miscellaneous Fires:	0
Rescues:	0
Hazardous Conditions:	5
Tree/Power Lines Down:	0

Of the total 366 calls for service, the breakdown according to response area is as follows:

Town of Yountville:	86 Calls
Veterans Home:	164 Calls
County Areas:	113 Calls
Napa City:	3 Calls

These averages are mostly consistent with history and call analysis. As is typical with virtually all fire departments today, our largest call volume continues to be medical emergencies.

## **Major Events**

### **Structure Fires:**

During the past three months Station 12 units responded to numerous structure fires throughout the county and into Napa City. Most recently there have been two fires in the county; one involving a single wide trailer, and another a detached garage, in which Yountville resources were dispatched. Thanks to the quick and effective work of the first arriving engine companies, the damage on these fires was mostly limited to the structure of origin. Station 12 personnel assisted in fighting both fires with salvage and overhaul operations.

### **Special Events:**

Station 12 personnel continue to remain committed to making Yountville a special place to live, work and visit. Yountville personnel participated in the Leadership Napa Valley Class 33 Government Day on March 6<sup>th</sup>. We demonstrated a Tensioned High Line Rope System with an English Reeve. This rope system is used to get a patient or a victim from point A to point B safely, effectively, and efficiently. Multiple fire drills were conducted over the past couple months at the Veterans Home.

### **Equipment Maintenance:**

Annual ladder testing, inspection, and cleaning has been completed this quarter on all station apparatus. We also assisted with placing two new Napa County Fire Volunteer engines in service. Which comprised of mounting equipment, loading hose and configuring equipment to meet the County standard.

### **Training:**

We are privileged to be stationed near the Napa County Training Grounds and always stay busy with training. Not only do we try to train daily on various topics with our crew at Station 12, we also have our monthly drills with the surrounding stations. We are tasked with a specific topic for each month and train with multiple other engine crews. One of the main training topics of this quarter was modern fire behavior. Engine companies completed a two-part training series, consisting of spending time both in the classroom and at the training grounds. Annually, thousands of hours are dedicated to learning and perfecting our trade so that we may provide the best service available. The Napa County Technical Rescue Team's monthly drills consisted of, Heavy lifting and stabilization, Low Angle Rope Rescue Operations, and Confined Space. January kicked off with another Napa County Volunteer Academy. Station 12 employees assist Sunday's and Wednesday nights. The personnel at Station 12 help train the new volunteer recruits on the fundamentals of fire, rescue, and EMS operations. The pool of students is comprised of recruits from the nine volunteer stations located throughout the County of Napa. Once completed with the training program, the recruits will be assigned to their respective stations where they will respond to emergency incidents.



**Prevention:**

We like to be involved within the community not only with special events but spreading knowledge and teaching fire prevention. This quarter we participated in multiple walk throughs with local businesses, wineries, and homes. A walk through of a building allows us to get to know the contents, fire prevention systems, and layouts of the structure. With the daylight savings falling in this quarter we were available to assist residents with battery changing of smoke detectors, a service we are always happy to offer year-round.

**Safety Message**

As we approach another dry summer in drought conditions, we would like to remind homeowners of defensible space. We encourage removing dead dry vegetation within 100 feet of your home.
